

Isaiah 24

End Times Implications

Isaiah chapter 24 appears to be an overview of the end times and the activities which are to follow, this present day. A picture is formed in verses 1 through 12 of these last days, where as those who are building upon wood, hay and stubble (1 Cor 3:12) will soon face an irreversible misery. The day is soon coming where the unsaved will realize the truth that all is vanity and vexation of the spirit. Not only will this peak at the time of the rapture, but will continue through to the advent of the kingdom age, and into eternity. These verses speak much of the pain and sorrow that this age can bring. It speaks of a land that is “utterly spoiled” (v.3), lawless, where there is a sense of hopelessness (v.12), and a deterioration of the family and the homes that they live in (v.10-12). This is a time that is void of all joy (v.8 - v.11), where by God is no longer receiving praise.

Verses 13 through 15 speak of the remnant of Jews which God will identify and which will turn to Jesus as Messiah during the great tribulation as described in Revelation chapter 7 verses 1 through 8.

We then move into the great tribulation itself where God will “speak unto them in his wrath, and vex them in his sore displeasure” (Psalms 2:5). All the while, saints of the age will once again be gathered together (v.16) and singing praises to God.

After this, we see that when the Day of Jehovah shall pass, God in his righteousness will punish the god of this world along with his host. At which time, “heaven shall” be “opened” and he that is called Faithful and True will be sitting upon a white horse, and in “righteousness he doth judge and make war.”

Isaiah chapter 24 proves to be a concise and condensed view into the wickedness of this present evil day and subsequent end time days, taking us through the great tribulation and into the beginning of the kingdom age.
